From the Pile on Fr. Kirk's Desk...

The Rector's Annual Report: Through the guidance of the Gospel appointed for that Sunday. Matthew 4:12-23



With the Super bowl next week I want to ask you what it means to be a fan?

Promotion: Fans promote their team. They wear logo shirts, team jerseys, hats, and have team bumper stickers on their

cars.

Attendance: If at all possible, fans go to the football stadium to watch the games. They want to bear witness, in person, their love and support for their team.

Gatherings: Fans gather together. They invite other fans and potential fans to attend football parties once a week.

What if your team is really good...what if your team is a winner? Is it easier to feel confident? Is it easier to be a fan? (prideful)

What if your team is not good at all...what if your team is a loser? Is it harder to feel confident? Is it harder to be a fan? (embarrassment)

Would you say it is true that a team has more fans all of a sudden when that team is on a hot winning streak? I think the answer is certainly YES. That would also mean that some fans abandon their team when things get hard and don't turn out the way they think they should...and with this abandonment usually comes complaining about the owner, coaches, or players. "That so called hall of fame coach or multimillion dollar quarterback is not worth it!"

For the fans that stick with their team, what happens when the season is over? We still see the occasional jersey and hat, but there are no longer football games to attend or football

parties to host. Being a football fan gets put on hold....until the next season.

Let's get off of football and look at something different. Are you a fan of Jesus? I wonder what that looks like? A fan of Jesus...

If I compare being a football fan with being a Jesus fan, I'm not sure being a fan of Jesus is the best thing...

Instead of comparing being a football fan with being a Jesus fan, let's think about the difference between being a Fan of Jesus with being a Follower of Jesus.

Fans of Jesus might be those folks that:

Attend worship more often during certain times of the year or stop attending during certain times of the year...attending worship might be a matter of convenience, or a lower priority. Fans of Jesus might choose to stay home if they know the worship style for the week is not their preference, or they dislike the way the chairs are arranged, or maybe they are upset with the clergy or another member.

Does our attendance or prayer life increase or decrease with the ups and downs in our lives or with the perception of our individual needs or desires? What about study or reading scripture? Is this something that only occurs during certain liturgical seasons? Have you noticed that there are some fans of Jesus that only try to act like Christians when they are in Church.

Are we Fans of Jesus?... or are we Followers of Jesus?

It has been said that if Jesus had handed his Disciples a Mission Statement the Church would be in better shape. Without a mission statement it is too easy to get off track, to get lost...it is too easy to become simply a fan of Jesus.

If we are fans of Jesus we can stay in the distance and come out when things are good... when it is easy. (winning) But when things get hard our focus shifts to other things that we feel will lift us up to the sensation or perception of being on a winning team.

If we are Followers of Jesus we intentionally, with God's help, try to stay equally focused on Jesus in both the good times and the bad...during the easy times and the times that are hard.

Ah... if only Jesus had given us a mission statement!

I think he did....and it's right here in today's Gospel and it is all about being a Follower of Jesus.

"As Jesus walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea-- for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him. Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people." Matthew 4:21-23

Jesus said, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Our mission statement is to be Followers of Jesus. We are to follow him every day, through thick and thin...following is the priority, even when it is inconvenient or uncomfortable, or not the popular thing to do.

Jesus has called us to follow him, and with a purpose. We are to fish for people. Fish for people? How do we do that? To learn to fish for people we have to follow Jesus with our eyes open...we can't follow blindly. When we open our eyes to what Jesus did it is clear that we are to learn from what he did...and what he did was he taught in their places of worship, he proclaimed the good news of the kingdom, and he healed people from every disease and every sickness. And as it says in today's Gospel, Jesus did this among the people. He went among the people, be it in their places of worship, the wilderness, or the houses of the unclean. He went fishing wherever he could make a catch.

There might be different seasons to catch different types of fish, but the season to reel in people to Jesus is all year round. To fish for people we have to know what to teach, what to proclaim, and how to heal people.

We learn how to do this by seeking Jesus more than one day a week. And we learn this by steady participation in worship and in the life of Christian community.

The framework that will help us stay focused on being followers of Jesus is the 5 Marks of Mission.

Five Marks of Mission

- To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- To teach, baptize and nurture new believers
- To respond to human need by loving service
- To seek to transform unjust structures of society
- To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth

Also...My own personal "6th" Mark of Mission is to create a sanctuary from the pain and brokenness of the world where everyone who walks through our doors can truly experience belonging. I don't want people to just "fit in".

Jesus was not about creating a community where people fit in. Jesus created a community where people belonged.

As individuals and as a community, these Marks of Mission will focus our fishing as we learn new ways to Teach, Proclaim, and bring Healing to broken lives.

As the Rector, it is my duty at the annual meeting to report on the health of the parish. So I ask myself, are we Fans or are we Followers? The only honest answer is Yes. Yes we are both Fans and Followers... each and every one of us are both, but now we know the difference between being a Fan and Follower of Jesus and we get to go fishing together.

As we move forward I ask that be encouraged that our Average Sunday Attendance is up from last year as are our Pledges and Giving. As I look back on the past year our participation in educational opportunities is up across the board; Adults, Youth, and Children.

Our participation in outreach continues to be up...it is a part of our Spiritual DNA, but there are new faces doing new things, both inside and outside of these walls. This makes me smile.

This is all GREAT, but we have only begun. Now the challenge is to continue to grow beyond being Fans of Jesus...and Follow him each and every day of our lives.

The Bishop's Corner

At Convention 2012, I announced the goal of reducing the assessment on parishes, a goal we can achieve if we improve our stewardship. So far, we have reduced the assessment by 1% and we have authorized the deduction of rent, which makes the assessment more equitable and helps a few parishes that in some respects are in the greatest need. But recently, we have hit some set backs in our efforts to bolster stewardship. Turnout for the excellent Stewardship Workshop in Las Vegas was disappointing. Then our stewardship facilitator for convention backed out. The message I'm getting from the universe is "this ain't gonna be easy."



But there are three parts of the life of the church that we have to mobilize for the sake of God's mission in Nevada and for the sake of our own spiritual well-being: **stewardship**, **evangelism**, and **community engagement**. To give up on any of those three projects would be to give up on the diocese and just do maintenance work while the church declines. So we will persist.

We get a re-do on the Stewardship Workshop with Timothy Dombek, Arizona Canon for Stewardship and a nationally acclaimed stewardship facilitator. That will be **March 21-22 at St. Paul's, Sparks**. The people who did attend the Las Vegas workshop reported finding it very helpful. And I will find another top shelf stewardship facilitator for our Convention.

Stewardship is essential to our spiritual health because it flips the switch from **me first consumer spirituality** to **the joy of generosity**. It is the triumph of faith over fear in action. It is the healing of shame and anxiety, both of which attach to money like leeches. It isn't just about the church getting more money. It's also about the church giving more of its money away. It's a spiritual thing – the difference between spiritual life and spiritual death. Faithful stewardship of relationships, time, talent, and treasure makes us the kind of community someone would want to be part of. It is the essential foundation for evangelism. And it is essential to our ability to reduce the 24% assessment that is still a boot on the necks of our congregations.

There is also good news on the stewardship front. 35 Nevadans attended The Episcopal Network For Stewardship training last summer. Grace in the Desert graciously hosted our workshop and St. Paul's will do so for us in March. 45 people did attend our workshop over the course of two days. That is a low number, but we can be grateful for the 45 people who did give their time and attention for the sake of their church. Plus we battle a stereotype that Latinos don't do stewardship. Well, Latinos from All Saints and St. Luke's were there.

Thanks in no small part to better stewardship practices, a number of our congregations had markedly better pledge drives this Fall than in years past. (Stewardship is not just about pledge drives – but they are one of the barometers of congregational health and vitality.) I see better relationships in many of our congregations than I saw a few years ago. Yes, this is part and parcel of stewardship. The first thing we are stewards of is our God-given relationships. So the glass is more than half full.

We are not giving up on this one. If the universe says "this ain't gonna be easy," ranching is not easy, mining is not easy, church is not easy. G. K. Chesterton once said "Christianity has not been tried and found wanting. It has been found difficult and not tried." Our job in Nevada is to insure that this difficult thing is tried – by us.

Greetings everyone! By the time you read this we will have elected 3 new Vestry members. I want to thank Victoria Sidener, Ken Stine and Pam Lightfoot for their service to the Vestry. The Vestry will have a retreat in early March.

In my report at our Annual Meeting on January 26th, I mentioned the 5 Marks of Mission. There will be many opportunities for us to demonstrate how we fulfill them during the year. Jr. Warden's Annual Report



This past year saw quite a bit accomplished around the church. Some of it was planned, some of it wasn't.

The planned events were as follows:

1. New thermostats were installed in the church.
2. Four (4) dead trees were removed from the north fence line.
3. A baby changing station was installed in the restroom across from the kitchen.
4. "Bird glue" was placed in the areas where the birds were roosting and making nests. This worked very well.
5. The new cross was installed on the south side of the church.

The un-planned events were as follows:

1. Several leaks were found in our irrigation system which necessitated the installation of new plumbing, pressure control valves and control boxes in both the North and South furnace rooms. Repairs had to be made to the lines and concrete removed and replaced.
2. Two (2) new toilets were installed in the women's restroom.
3. The kitchen floor was steam cleaned and re-sealed.

4. Numerous burnt out light bulbs were replaced throughout the church.
5. New landscaping was done on the southwest corner of the building.
6. Pre-emergent has been placed in the bare ground areas to stem the growth of weeds this next year.

Two work days were held last year. They both accomplished much needed maintenance. Again, many thanks to all who participated!

This will be my last Epistle report as your Junior Warden. It has been very interesting to see the "inner" workings of this old building. There have been many challenges this past year which we have met. There are many more challenges facing us, which I am sure we will be able to deal with as well. The St. Paul's family always pulls together to "git 'er done" when the need arises.

Project Luci

In Sub Saharan Africa, 589 million people do not have electricity. That's more people than in all the people in the United States, Canada and Mexico combined. If there is any light after the sun goes not, it comes from a kerosene type candle that is very dangerous and emits toxic fumes.

The Diocese of Nevada and our partner Diocese in Kenya are united to bring light to rural Kenyans through Luci lanterns. Luci is a lantern that uses a solar rechargeable lithium ion battery and LED lights. For every hour in the sun, it provides one hour of SAFE sustainable light. It's designed to be independent of the power grid in places where electricity is inaccessible or unaffordable.



The gift of a Luci lantern will be life-changing for the children and families that receive one. Across the Diocese of Nevada we hope to raise enough money to purchase 100 lanterns.

Because we will purchase these in bulk and directly from the manufacturer, Mpowerd, each lantern will cost only **\$9.50**

During Epiphany, the season of light, let's change lives.
