For this month's service activity, EYC will be creating blessing bags and we need your help! What's a blessing bag you ask? A blessing bag is a Ziplock bag stocked with food, toiletries, and other items one might need while living on the street. We will be gathering up these items until January 25th when the EYC will meet and put together the bags. Here are some ideas for the blessing bags: granola bars, cereal bars, snack crackers, peanut butter, beef jerky, raisins, applesauce cups/pouches, juice boxes, trail mix, gum, bottled water, pop top meat or sausages, hand sanitizer, baby wipes, toothbrush/toothpaste, wash cloth, soap, shampoo, lotion, comb, nail clippers, deodorant, socks, chapstick, travel sized tissues. These items can be from hotels or other travel sized items. The point is for them to fit into a gallon sized Ziplock.

Fill a Backpack for a Legislator

The December issue of The Lutheran magazine featured an article about Advent, and how much we miss if we plunge right into the busyness of Christmas right after Thanksgiving. But the thing that struck me most in the article was an illustration by the author, Gertrud Mueller Nelson. Now that we are in the season of Epiphany, the image seems particularly appropriate. It shows the Holy Family in modern dress. Baby Jesus is sitting in a shopping cart. The family is bundled up against the weather, and father, unshaven and with a backpack on his back, pushes the cart past urban high-rises. An angel flies overhead. This could represent the flight into Egypt. But I think there is more to it than that.

Jesus came for the poor, the homeless, the dispossessed of every age, and they are very much with us today. We who do Advocacy talk about the difference between Charity and Advocacy, and we recognize that both are important. Charity is about direct aid to those in need, and Advocacy is about making structural changes in society so the causes of need go away.

Lutheran-Episcopal Ministry in Nevada (LEAN) will have an event on January 19th, Martin Luther King Jr. Day; it will involve both Charity and Advocacy. It will be a time to learn about issues that will be on the agenda of the 2015 Legislature. Since school funding will be a major issue, LEAN will be doing Charity as well. It's our way of telling legislators we're concerned about schools and we want them to be, too. Your help is needed.

All new and returning state Senators and Assembly Members have been invited. Those who attend will assemble backpacks filled with school supplies. The backpacks will be given to a low-income school of the legislator's choice. We're doing this in January, the middle of the school year, because many children and teachers have used all the supplies they started with in the fall, and there isn't money to buy more. If you're living out of a shopping cart, buying notebook paper isn't likely to be your highest priority, but doing well in school is the way up and out. That is why we're asking you to consider donating to this effort. Our Advocate, Rev. Mike Patterson, has arranged with Office Depot to buy supplies at a huge discount, so donations will go a long way. Donations can be sent to LEAN at the address above, or through your church office, marked "LEAN backpacks." If you prefer to donate items instead of cash, please use this list as a guide: Pencils, pencil bags, ballpoint pens, glue sticks, crayons, colored pencils, highlighters, 3-ring binders, spiral notebooks, erasers, pocket folders, sticky notes, copy paper, lined paper.

St. Paul's Episcopal Church Vestry Nominations

Patricia Unruh

What is your current level of participation in the life of St. Paul's and what ministries are you currently involved in, both at St. Paul's and out in the world?

I attend the Sunday 9am service. I have been trained and serve as a Healing Minister and a Lay Eucharistic Minister(LEM). I attend our healing services on Wednesday and Thursday. I am a Food Pantry volunteer and attend Lectio Devina weekly. I am part of St. Paul's Pastoral Care team serving as part of our Prayer Circle and as a Eucharistic Visitor. I am one of the LEAN communicators for St. Paul's. I am in my first year of attending Education for Ministry (EFM) classes.

Have you ever served on a parish Vestry or similar church board? If so, did you serve in a particular capacity?

At the age of 18, I first served on the Board for the Anchorage, AK, Metropolitan Community Church (MCC) and was involved with membership, specifically as a communication liaison between church members and the board. I served as chair of Reconciling Ministries and co-chair of the Soup Kitchen with the First United Methodist Church in Fairbanks, AK. I have also been on the board for MCC Burlington, VT and MCC White River Jct., NH. Both churches were start up churches serving the LGBT community in both VT and NH.

Why do you want to serve on St. Paul's Vestry?

When I was first approached to serve on Vestry, I was pleased and touched, that my gifts would be recognized as helpful to St. Paul's. My serving on Vestry is about my continuing stewardship. I believe that God calls

me to go beyond attending weekly services and contributing financially to my church. That when asked, I need to be actively involved in helping to make decisions on how the church can best serve it's congregation and the community in which it is located.

The Vestry needs both "visionaries" and "doers". Where would you fit into this mix and what do you perceive as your gifts for ministry?

I have been told that I am a "modern thinker" and I believe this to be true. My physical limitations place me in a position of seeing needs that others may not be as aware of. I see myself as both a "visionary" and "doer". I believe that I am a team player. The church boards on which I have served with in the past required a great amount of co-operation and communication. I have been involved in starting three churches in three different states with an outreach to the LGBT community, which entailed having a vision for our church, making plans for building our church and then going out into the community and implementing those plans.

How do you currently see St. Paul's living into the mission of Christ?

In my short time at St. Paul's, I have been on the receiving end of the Grace of this community. I see St. Paul's as the body of Christ, a church working towards helping it's members to love God and each other. I also see St. Paul's support of the Food Pantry and LEAN as part of Christ's mission to go out and serve as witnesses of God's love in our Sparks/Reno community and to see Christ in all people.

Where do you see St. Paul's in three years?

I envision LEAN becoming an important part of serving not only the concerns of the St. Paul's congregation, but also known for advocating for our Sparks/Reno community. My hope is

that St. Paul's will also increase its membership to include People of Color and the LGBT community.
