From the Pile on Fr. Kirk's Desk...



I think it is interesting that Epiphany comes before the season of Lent. Yes, I know that on Epiphany we celebrate the arrival of the Wise Men and how they are so important to us because they were the first gentiles in which God revealed the incarnation. That is big...really BIG, however Epiphany is not when I have my Epiphany moments.

Lent! Lent is when I have most of my Epiphany moments. Lent is the time when we slow down (okay, I don't slow down at all, my life actually becomes the busiest of the entire year, but it is when I have the most "light bulb over the head" moments...so just humor me and run with it.) When we slow down we have a chance to observe the people and world around us. We have time reflect on and pray for who and what we encounter. We then have time to listen in order to begin the relationship of understanding.

This is not just a Lenten game, but a way of life. If we don't open our eyes and observe the people and world around us, how are we to know God? If we don't pray for what we see, then how are we to ever get out of our own heads and into the mind of the one who created us? If we don't listen for the details, how will we ever know how to respond?... It is in the responding that we meet Christ Jesus. It is in meeting Christ Jesus that our lives change; and not necessarily change for the easier, but things change for the better.

Stop and look around. Pray for what you see. Listen with intention to what is being shared. Respond...Acknowledge your Epiphany moments and respond like you never have before.

Monthly Receipt Summary



St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Sparks *Funding the Mission* March 2015

Last month we noted that our budget deficit left us with "much work to do". This month we are pleased to report that significant additional pledges were received after the annual meeting. While we still have a large short fall, our position improved by over \$9,000. If it hasn't been mentioned, it is never too late to make a pledge, or to consider an increase.

Being just two months into the year, and matrix on how we are doing doesn't against our expectation isn't really helpful, and so it hasn't been included. I can tell you that we are approximately \$5,000 ahead of our projected income for the two months. If that trend were to continue, we would approach a balanced budget, but that isn't the usual trend.

Much work to do as we continue our mission here at St. Paul's.

We will return to our regular format next month when we have results to report.

Over Commitment – Do less better and accomplish more.


Apathy – Life is too short not to care.

Bishop Dan's 13th EPISTLE TO THE NEVADANS



Seven Years in Nevada

"Who are you really wanderer?"

"Your job is to find what the world is trying to be."

-- William Stafford

I have been blessed to serve in Nevada these seven years now. (Consecrated January 5, 2008). It may not have been quite as dramatic as Heinrich Harrer's time in Tibet, but it has been quite a ride. I have seen a lot, heard a lot, and learned a lot. To quote President Nixon's Press Secretary, Ron Zeigler, "Mistakes were made" - in this case, by me. But the mistakes were part of my learning.

It would be ego gratifying if I could say the diocese was in shambles then but thanks to my heroic virtues we are now flourishing. The truth is the diocese was in pretty good shape in those days, even though it had some struggles. Today, we are still in good shape and we still have some struggles, just different struggles.

There are some positive signs. When I first arrived, a number of congregations were in the midst of rather destructive conflicts - clergy vs. laity; clergy vs. clergy; laity vs. laity - depending on the congregation. We still have conflicts. We always will if there is enough life in us to care about things, but I rarely see conflicts being that destructive these days. Note: that has nothing to do with me. I have not intervened *ex machina* to resolve anyone's disputes. The people just worked them through and got back to business. I am not claiming credit, just comparing then with now.

In a similar vein, congregations in conflict with the diocese were usually in conflict internally and vice versa. So as relationships within congregations have gotten better, their relationship with the diocese has gotten more trusting and cooperative.

As we have feuded less, we have engaged more actively in mission to the world outside our walls. We have particularly connected with schools. Last year most of our congregations gave generously to provide solar lanterns to our companion diocese in Kenya. Some congregations that formerly made a principle of not giving anything to their communities are now leaders in local ministries.

I won't do a tedious assessment of the diocese. Rather I'll just say that Nevada's been good to me and I am beginning to figure a few things out. It is an axiom of church life that a new rector needs to spend five years in a parish getting the lay of the land before launching off in any new directions. I'd say it takes a bishop at least seven years to get the lay of the land. I am not sure I have it yet, but I'm closer than I was a few years ago.

I still don't aspire to launch off in any new directions. I am still looking for where our heart actually lies. Like the poet William Stafford, I think my job is to "find out what the world wants to be." Part of that is sorting out what the church here is trying to be. Part of it is figuring out what the people outside our walls need us to be. Discerning all of that will take some ongoing trial and error.

My sense is that the stewardship programs we have been running for a couple of years have struck a chord. They have touched our felt need for a spirituality of faith, gratitude, and generosity that run quite against the grain to secular society's prevailing fear-based *modus operandi*. Time will tell whether a meme of faith, gratitude, and generosity will spread through our people blessing their lives and making them blessings to others. It is possible. Something like that appears to be beginning even now.

I see so much alienation, futility, and despair in the secular world around us. I feel like Jesus looking on the crowd who were "harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd." Matthew 9: 36 and I wonder if the Church (the Body of Christ, the continuing Incarnation, the hands and feet of Jesus in Nevada AD 2015) might have something to offer them. We feel competent to feed the physically hungry but do we feel that we have anything to offer to the spiritually hungry? That is a fresh question I am asking these days. If we have life within us, if we have something that stills the mind, refreshes the heart, and ennobles the soul, then we might consider how to go about sharing it with those who do not yet have it. If we do not have these spiritual treasures, that is a much deeper question.

There is an adage in spiritual practice: you can't give what you don't have. So if we don't have a rich soulful life in the practice of our faith, we cannot do much for the despairing folks outside our walls. But there's another adage equally true in Christianity: you don't really have it until you've shared it with someone else. I wonder if really opening wide the doors of our churches will allow us to breathe.

What is IDM and who was Ron Petersen? International Development Missions (IDM) is a small local federal and state recognized non-profit that provides medical care, clean water development, and education to rural communities in East Africa. Ron Petersen was a member of St. Paul's and a

mission-minded hydrogeology professional who did development work throughout the world. He was instrumental in founding IDM with other like-minded folks in 2001. At that time, the Most Reverend Katharine Jefferts Schori was Bishop of Nevada and she strongly supported the work of IDM. Ron passed away suddenly in 2007, but his presence and influence continues.



School Children Visiting the Clinic to Learn About Health

IDM built and continues to financially support the Mua Hills Medical Clinic southeast of Nairobi. The clinic provides direct care for a rural population of approximately 15,000 and conducts traveling medical programs to help prevent malaria and educate mothers on disease prevention. The clinic is also licensed by the Kenya Ministry of Health to both diagnose and treat AIDS.

IDM partners with the University of Nevada student group SAIWI. We have regularly sponsored joint mission trips where students studying in various disciplines such as hydrology, environmental sciences, and engineering enhance their training by designing and constructing clean water and erosion control systems. In addition, IDM helps train UNR interns majoring in community and public health. It is a rich and rewarding program for our volunteers and students alike!

IDM is completing the Mua Hills Learning Center, a small building that will house a library and computer stations for students of all ages. The Learning Center will be stocked with used books and computers donated by Northern Nevada residents. These used books and computers, which might have otherwise been dumped in local landfills, will enrich the community that currently has no library resource. The Learning Center is scheduled for completion this year and IDM is currently developing fund-raising projects to ship the library materials to Kenya.

St. Paul's Youth Group will be helping with this year's dinner and our parish always has a fun contingent at the event and the group is affectionately called the "St. Paul's Rowdies". St. Paul's also donates its kitchen facility for much of the food prep.
