We will ease into coming back together with a modified summer schedule (June-August). We will offer a combined 10:00 a.m. Rite II service with blended music from the praise and traditional music teams. We will continue to broadcast the service on Zoom for those of you who are not ready or able to return in person. Adjustments to this schedule may happen, but only if the need arises. After Labor Day, we are planning to return to our regular Sunday schedule (including a return of the choir at the 11:00.)

Will there be any restrictions? Yes, as you probably already know that the Governor now requires masks to be worn by everyone when you are inside. This applies to our Sunday service. If you do not have a mask, one will be available at the door.

We will continue to only offer bread at Communion and there will not be any Sunday school until September. We will have childcare coverage though. We will have an after service social time in the garden.

North Entry Project: Your Help is Needed

The North Entry of the church will see a big improvement in the fall of 2021 when new pavers and plants will be installed. The pavers will match those in the Garden. This project is needed because currently, the poor drainage in the area creates pooling of water, water damage, and in winter, ice forms near the door creating a slipping hazard. This update and beautification project will not only solve the drainage and safety problems but will make the front door area appear more inviting for both parishioners and visitors.

A donor has generously committed to paying half of the \$14,000 needed to complete the project and has asked for parishioners to match their \$7,000 donation. Your help is needed, and any amount is welcome and appreciated.

The Community Food Pantry

COVID moved our distribution to a drive-thru we can serve more efficiently. Rain or Shine, Blistering Hot or Freezing Cold, our volunteers serve this community with dignity and respect. So far, these dedicated volunteers have helped 15,660 people, this is 1020 more people over the same time last year. We are on pace to feed more than 30,000 people this year. Like most of us, our fixed clients are

struggling to find their recovery in these wearisome times.

Our mobile program serving Seniors 60+ is now running on Saturdays and Tuesdays, serving three additional sites. COVID was and continues to be a challenging time for this population. The isolation brings this population additional stress. We recently had a donation of 4 Teddy Bears, and they were handed out to the seniors. John, the receipt of one of the bears, was so grateful. He is a cancer patient and said that with this bear, he will always have a companion. We were happy that we could brighten his day.

Traditional Music

Many years ago, somebody thought of building an instrument consisting of hundreds, even thousands, of metal and wooden pipes that would each make a unique sound when air was passed through them. By combining all of these pipes in various configurations, somehow they produce a noise that has now become the quintessential sound of church. You rarely, if ever, hear the sound of the pipe organ outside of a church setting, and so far many it is a comforting reminder of their days growing up in a warm, welcoming environment (such as St. Paul's). The ministry of traditional music in church is, well, traditional. Hymns are the folk songs of liturgy: familiar tunes that can be heard all around the world, reminding people that, no matter where they are, there is commonality amongst all of us. Sadly, at this current time, it isn't possible to elevate the music with the angelic voices of the choir. However, those voices are still present in the congregation, and alongside the Praise Team and the Teachout's extraordinary musical abilities, Sunday morning worship is a truly unifying, spiritual experience.

Online Worship

Possibly the newest ministry at St. Paul's, broadcasting the services online was a critical part of the continuation of the church while we were sequestered at home. Today, it continues to provide a spiritual lifeline to those who can not attend in-person for health, geographic, or myriad other reasons. Thanks to Fr. Kirk's love of technology, the experience of online worship at St. Paul's is one of the more advanced in the area, allowing those who are sitting at home to feel like they are part of the worship, amongst the congregation. New to all of us, improvements continue to be made to enhance this form of outreach so that, on Sunday morning, we can extend the great works of all

the ministries at St. Paul's, because a church is more than just a building.

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Sparks Funding the Mission July 2021

Operating receipts for the 2nd quarter totaled \$83,960 and operating expenses totaled \$68,396. This gave us an operating surplus for the quarter of \$15,564 which beat the budget's predicted deficit of \$3,838 by \$19,402. This second quarter surplus combined with a similar positive result in the first quarter has given us a \$30,174 surplus for the first six months of 2021. It is typical in the first two quarters for us to run a surplus because several parishioners give their entire yearly pledge in the first half of the year. I try to incorporate this pattern in the budget projections, but higher than expected giving along with some expense savings greatly exceeded these budget adjustments. Considering that the pandemic was going strong through most of these six months, our results are exceptional compared to many churches.

As we move through the next two quarters, I expect this cumulative surplus to shrink as our expenses should exceed receipts. However, I am reasonably confident that we will still end the year with a significant surplus and beat the budget's prediction of a \$1,400 deficit.

The monthly Financial Statement of Mission contains detail on all our financial activity and is posted in the narthex.
