It's going to be a mess for a while. It won't be fully completed until almost the end of September. The concrete drainage trough that runs down the middle of the asphalt is the cause of the lengthy project.

Funding the Mission

(This was inadvertently left out of last months newsletter...sorry for the delay.)

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, July 2023



The second quarter financial results for 2023 tracked quite closely to the budget projections. Operating receipts totaled \$59,091 and operating expenses totaled \$71,970. This gave us an

operating deficit for the quarter of \$12,879 compared to the budget's deficit prediction of \$10,003. It has become typical in recent years to run quarterly deficits in the last three quarters due to a large amount of annual pledges being pre-paid in the 1st quarter. A bigger concern for me with inflation present everywhere, is whether we are keeping our expenses under control. For the second quarter, we exceeded our expense budget by \$965, but for the year to date, we are under budget by \$2,011.

Consequently, the bottom line results for the 1st half of the year are very favorable. We have accumulated a surplus of \$22,177 compared to the budget's prediction of a \$10,463 surplus. Again, with pre-paid pledges, we should expect a surplus in the first half of the year, but with total giving where it's at and expenses under control, I am hopeful that at year end we can again keep a portion of this surplus instead of using our savings to cover the budget's predicted \$16,974 annual deficit.

A little bit about Dorothy Jean: She is an American concert organist, composer, lyricist, playwright, and author. She is the former organist at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City (1990–2003), the first female organist to hold that post. She was also organist for the Paul Winter Consort at the Cathedral's Easter and Christmas services and performed with the ensemble on their Grammy Awardwinning album Silver Solstice, released in 2005. In 2005, Papadakos co-produced Pompeii the Musical, for which she wrote the book, music and lyrics. Its production was well-received, breaking box office records when it premiered in Wilmington, North Carolina.

In 2017, her first novel, The Kingdom of Winter, was published. Using fantasy characters to address climate change concerns, the book is now used in a science and literature curriculum for middle-school students.

Misreading Scripture with Western Eves: Removina Cultural **Blinders** to Better Understand the Bible by E. Randolph Richards and Brandon J. O'Brien.

What was clear to the original readers of Scripture is not always clear to us. Because of the cultural distance between the biblical world and our contemporary setting, we often bring modern Western biases to the text. For example:

> When Western readers hear Paul exhorting women to "dress modestly," we automatically think in terms of sexual modesty. But most women in

- that culture would never wear racy clothing. The context suggests that Paul is likely more concerned about economic modesty—that Christian women not flaunt their wealth through expensive clothes, braided hair and gold jewelry.
- Some readers might assume that Moses married "below himself" because his wife was a dark-skinned Cushite. Actually, Hebrews were the slave race, not the Cushites, who were highly respected. Aaron and Miriam probably thought Moses was being presumptuous by marrying "above himself."
- Western individualism leads us to assume that Mary and Joseph traveled alone to Bethlehem. What went without saying was that they were likely accompanied by a large entourage of extended family.

Biblical scholars Brandon O'Brien and Randy Richards shed light on the ways that Western readers often misunderstand the cultural dynamics of the Bible. They identify nine key areas where modern Westerners have significantly different assumptions about what might be going on in a text. Drawing on their own cross-cultural experience in global mission, O'Brien and Richards show how better self-awareness and understanding of cultural differences in language, time and social mores allow us to see the Bible in fresh and unexpected ways.

Getting beyond our own cultural assumptions is increasingly important for being Christians in our interconnected and globalized world. Learn to read Scripture as a member of the global body of Christ.
